Scottish Archaeology Month (SAM), co-ordinated by Archaeology Scotland, has existed for more than 20 years. Alongside Doors Open Days it constitutes Scotland's contribution to European Heritage Days and helps deliver Aim 4 of Scotland's Archaeology Strategy.

SAM encourages people to interact with their archaeology, history and heritage by co-ordinating and promoting a varied programme of events all across Scotland. These include guided walks, exhibitions, excavations, lectures, performances, re-enactments, traditional skills workshops, storytelling, guided tours, conferences and many other activities.

SAM takes place every year in September but includes events running from the end of August until mid-October.



#1 Aberdalgie and Dupplin Church

A classic example of an ecclesiastical church cluster set within the historic Dupplin Estate, an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, with links back to the wars of Scottish Independence, the formation of the British State and the Lords Oliphant, Hay and Dewar dynasties. Come and enjoy a guided tour of the beautiful church sanctuary, ancient burial grounds and walled garden. Refreshments provided, visitors are welcome to bring a picnic.

#2 AK Bell Library





This grade A listed building was designed by Perth City Architect, William Macdonald Mackenzie and operated as an Infirmary from 1836 until 1914 when it became a hospital for WW1 soldiers. Later on it became a tuberculosis centre and offices for Perth Education Authority, before reopening in 1994 as AK Bell Library, the flagship library and archive for Perth & Kinross. Join us for a behind-the-scenes tour of the library building and a chance to see some of the treasures of our archive and local history collections, led by our expert librarians and archivists.

#3 Auchterarder Picturehouse

P3 | 3 W ____



The former Regal Cinema (Auchterarder Picturehouse) is a unique surviving example of small-town cinema from the 1920s, retaining much of its early Art Deco character. The building retains a good number of decorative interior fittings and fixtures including a grand stair with decorative cast iron bannisters, and a rare, curving pressed tin-panel ceiling within the main auditorium.

Dunkeld Community Archive houses a growing collection of photographs, documents, research and memorabilia relating to the local area, as well as the regimental archive of the Scottish Horse. An exhibition on photography from mid 19th Century to the present day. The earliest ever photographs of Dunkeld by Dr John Wheeley Gough Gutch will be on display along with Dunkeld's Andrew Finley MacKenzie's work.

#8 The Glovers' Hall



The Glover Incorporation of Perth has a history in Perth dating back to the Royal Charter of 1210. Established as a trade/guild to secure the rights of glove makers in Perth, the Incorporation has a rich history as can now be exhibited in the new Perth Musuem. The Glovers' Hall is used for meetings of the Incorporation twice yearly, and sits on the first floor of the property.

Early Victorian building with artefacts from earlier medieval building. Designed by William Stirling of Dunblane. Beautiful Morris and Burne Jones stained glass windows. Four ancient yew trees in Kirkyard predate the building by several hundred years. Magnificent Norman and Beard organ from 1913. Church members will be on hand to answer questions. Refreshments will be available.

#10 Morenish Yard





A contemporary new-build house, Morenish Yard, , created with architects Kirsty Lees and David McMillan, replicates the shape of a Scottish long house. The zinc-clad building appears to float above its stone foundation. The interior, which is the focus of my work, is designed to help root the building in its setting and quietly nestling into the surroundings with a colour palette of soft greens, yellows, pinks and browns, that borrow from the mountainous Loch Tay views.

#12 Perth Art Gallery









The establishment of Perth's museum collections coincided with a period of rapid British Imperial expansion. As people from Perth & Kinross emigrated or travelled to capitalise on the opportunities which an expanding Empire offered, they sent or brought back evidence of their interactions with other cultures and societies. Many worked for The Honourable British East India Company; a private trading company which controlled huge areas of the Indian sub-continent and exploited 'market opportunities' through invasion, coercion, and advantageous alliances. This tour explores some of the activities of the East India Company through the lens of the museum collections on display at Perth Museum.

Loch Leven nature reserve is a haven for families, nature lovers and wildlife watchers alike. Set on the southern shore of the loch, the reserve is home to Swallows and breeding waders in spring and summer, migratory geese and Whooper Swans in autumn, and woodland birds all year round. We have a café, shop and toilets.

#16 Scotlandwell Well and Washhouse





The village of Scotlandwell lies to the east of Loch Leven, approximately 4 miles east of Kinross. It is one of the great historic sites of Kinross-shire. Named Fons Scotiae by the Romans who passed this way nearly 2,000 years ago, the curative waters that bubble up through the sandy ground were used by Red Friars who maintained a hospital in the village between 1250 and 1587. Thousands of pilgrims came to Scotlandwell to take the water, the most famous perhaps being King Robert the Bruce who is alleged to have found a cure for leprosy here.

#17 St. Andrews Church, Forteviot





The historic village of Forteviot is in the heart of the Strathearn Valley between Forgandenny and Dunning. No place has a better claim to be the Cradle of Scotland than Forteviot, where a Pictish royal palace once stood alongside a huge prehistoric ceremonial complex. The church contains a collection of Pictish stones and a historic handbell. Enjoy a guided tour of this beautiful, historic church and village, with village hall, green, carved cross replica, church with historic stones, handbell and grounds. Refreshments available.

#18 St. John's





A church has stood on this site since the early 12th century, giving rise to Perth's alternative name "St. Johnstoun". In May 1959 John Knox preached his famous sermon here. Sir Robert Lorimer was responsible for restoration in 1926 and further restoration works have recently been completed with more waiting to be done. The Kirk has the largest collection of bells in the country and some stunning stained glass windows. Come and enjoy guided tours and organ music.

#19 St. Leonards in the Fields Church





A prominently-sited Scots Gothic-style Category A listed church building overlooking South Inch. Designed by J. J. Stevenson, building work began in May 1883, with the church opening in 1885. The church, with its iconic tower and crown spire, is a Perth landmark. Come learn about our history, and see a collection of historic church items. Tea, coffee and refreshments are available in the church hall. Organ recitals will take place. The church will open to visitors on Sunday after 11.15am morning worship, to which all visitors are invited.

#20 St. Matthew's Church





St. Matthew's Church celebrated 150 years of the building in Tay Street, Perth in November 2021. Refurbished in 2016 it has retained most of the features of the original building. Come along for music, art exhibits, guided information, an exhibit by Scone Photo Club, teas and coffee.

#21 Sunnybrae Cottage





A fine survival of an 18th century Celtic Cuppil cottage that predates the settlement of Pitlochry surrounding it. Distinct within the streetscape because of its corrugated-iron roof (with thatch surviving beneath!), the cottage has evidence for a hanging lum, the former fireplace around which family life would have been played out. An 'A' listed monument, Sunnybrae Cottage is in the care of Historic Environment Scotland (HES). Sign up for this rare opportunity to see the remains of the archaeological investigation which took place inside the cottage, peeling back centuries of building and use.

#22 PKAVS Walled Garden





Historic Walled Garden in the grounds of Murray Royal, established to feed the tenants of Pitcullen House. The garden is now leased from the NHS by PKAVS a local charity, supporting people from Perth and Kinross in their recovery from poor mental health and wellbeing issues by providing meaningful activity.



Three Forts on the Tay: Excavations at Moncrieffe, Moredun and Abernethy, Perth and Kinross 2014-17



Despite a resurgence in Scottish fort studies, few sites have been investigated, especially at the scale reported in this volume. Perth and Kinross Heritage Trust (with AOC Archaeology Group) excavated three hilltop forts on the Tay estuary to explore their enclosing works and internal buildings, uncovering an impressive assemblage of small finds.


At Moredun fort on Moncreiffe Hill, a previously unknown monumental roundhouse, a rare La Tène bird-head brooch, and evidence of shale bangle industry were uncovered. At Castle Law, Abernethy, excavated in the 1890s and the type-site of Childe's 'Abernethy complex', re-excavation prompted reassessment of the artefacts from original excavations to reveal new evidence of the deposition of artefacts and animal bones within its cistern. Excavation of the enclosing works of these sites, and Moncreiffe fort, suggest an evolution of fort defences from simple earth and stone ramparts to massive timber-laced walls – the murus Gallicus described by Caesar – reflecting high status sites with restricted access for a social elite.

Hillforts of The Tay was part of the Tay Landscape Partnership Scheme, a community heritage initiative and the results of this citizen science project make a significant contribution to establishing Tayside as a well-studied area for the site type both within Scotland, and further afield.
